to help the MUNners to perform their best.


And finally, the Secretary General Anisha Kenia spoke about her

There is no correct way to define xenophobia. There is no correct way to clarify or identify anti-Semitism. There is no correct way to avoid racism. Yet, we form mere definitions and explanatory theories and the origin of these words in order to euphemise it down to something to wrap our cynical heads around.

The Cambridge Dictionary defines xenophobia as an extreme dislike or fear of foreigners, their customs, beliefs or their religions. This prejudice, or hostility, rather has been deep-rooted throughout innumerable centuries. Be it Romanis or Jews, racism has been manifested and targeted immensely for these individuals, based on various aspects such as skin colour, national origin, and the most common – race.

Concerns have been raised about the increasing tendencies of Islamophobia and anti-Semitism, which have grown into alarming dangers to world peace and social euphony and balance. Another source of concern has been discrimination against refugees, mostly against people of African origin.

1 in every 50 people today is a migratory worker, a refugee or asylum seeker, or an immigrant residing in a foreign nation. According to current United Nations and International Organization for Migration estimates, around 150 million individuals live temporarily or permanently outside their country of origin. All these problems narrow down to one thing – xenophobia.

The term Roma or Romani refers to a large ethnic group of individuals who self-identify as members of several sub-groups based on present or former geographical locations, dialects, and occupations, among other factors. In Europe, there are around ten million Romanis. There are urbanised Roma groups as well. Romanis can be found in almost every European country.

Anti-Gypsyism can be defined as a type of a racial oppression tenet. Discrimination against Romanis is far-flung and ubiquitous throughout Europe. s the Commissioner for Human Rights of the Council of Europe has publicized, there are perturbing trends across Europe towards Romanis. Across the EU member states, using declamations to illicit hate towards the entire Roma population is rampant.


As Romanis are more prone to encounter discrimination, they are inevitably susceptible to natural disasters, armed conflicts, and economic wanes. In numerous nations, Romanis have been flagrantly murdered through the immorality of violent bigoted gangs.

Another major issue is anti-Semitism, which is "hostility toward Jews as a religious or minority group, frequently accompanied by social, economic, and political discrimination." Antisemitism has an extensive history in Europe, dating back to the Middle Ages. Pogroms, which were 'organised discriminatory acts of violence' against Jewish communities by the local population were common in Russia by the end of the 19th century, and were encouraged by governments' antisemitic policies. France and Austria, were also prone to attacks on Jewish communities.

The facts and figures do not portray the centuries of suffrage of the "blacks", "yellows", "browns" and races of the whole spectrum. However, there is a correct way to support- by speaking up for the silenced. There is a correct way to fight for justice- by reprimanding the bullies and questioning the not-so-innocent bystanders. There is a correct way to stop the injustice - by shutting down the stereo-types and stepping out of the echo-chambers.



SOVIET UNION-" Are you deaf, delegate??!!"



The SOCHUM committee today had some brave and concise points coming in from the delegates. One of them included ribbing between the delegate of the USA and the delegate of Pakistan.


The delegate of the USA scrutinized about how the delegate of Pakistan mentioned,
